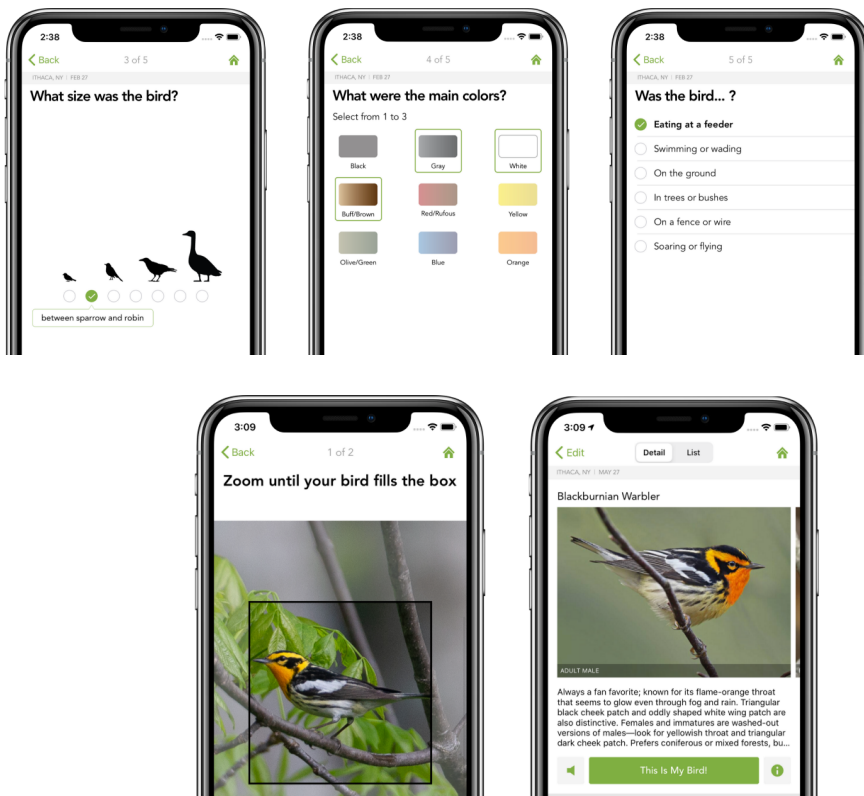
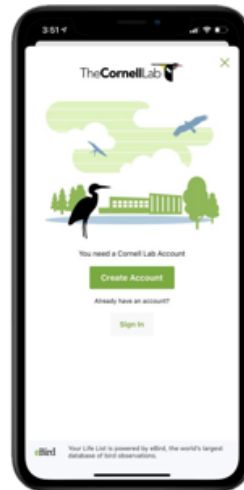


# Citizen Science

Now that you have spent some time observing birds and their behaviors Your next step it to join in an awesome Citizen Science App - Merlin Bird ID. This app will help you to identify birds, save them so that you can reference which birds you have found, and add those sightings to a larger database that helps researchers track bird populations.

## Setup the Account

1. Download the Merlin Bird Id app for free on your smart device.
2. Create an account.
3. Select the Bird Pack for your region and install it.



## Identifying Birds

1. Touch Start Bird ID
2. Choose your location.
3. Enter the date of the sighting.
4. Answer the three questions based on the bird you are watching or take a photo
5. Choose which bird you saw from the provided choices.
6. Select "This is My Bird!"
7. You'll be asked to confirm your bird sighting and location. Give your location a unique name!
