PAUL J. ALIOTO



Paul Alioto was born in NYC. He attended college at SUNY Oneonta, where he earned his BA in secondary education. He completed his Master's Degree in School Guidance at Brooklyn College (1992). He worked as a social studies teacher and then as a guidance counselor in NYC before his appointment as the Tupper Lake Middle/High School Principal in 1995. Paul earned his Doctorate in Teaching and Curriculum from Syracuse University in 1999. He is a past Superintendent of the Clifton-Fine Central School District in Star Lake and currently serves as Superintendent of the Dansville Central School District in the Finger Lakes Region. He was recognized as the 2015 Outstanding New York State Superintendent by the New York State Association for Computers and Technologies in Education (NYSCATE). Paul also serves on the Board of Trustees for the Finger Lakes Museum & Aquarium and is a volunteer first responder for the Dansville Ambulance Company.

LEE BAILEY



Mr. Bailey is the Managing Director and Managing Partner of Mission Finance, a climate Venture Studio. In addition, Mr. Bailey is a Managing Director of US Renewables Group ("USRG"), a Los Angeles based private equity fund that invests in renewable energy and clean fuel companies. At USRG, Mr. Bailey is actively involved in the management of the firm, has led investments in companies in the geothermal, concentrated solar and wind areas, is a member of the Board of Directors for several USRG portfolio companies and has led USRG's efforts to invest in emerging markets.

In addition, Mr. Bailey has served as the CEO of several start-up companies, including the Rural Health Care Corporation and Quantum Medical Corporation.

Mr. Bailey received a law degree from Washington University School of Law, a MS from Northwestern University and a BA from St. Lawrence University.

Lance Balk



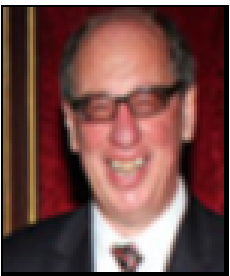

For the past 25 years, Mr. Balk has served as a member of the Belden, Inc. board of directors. Belden designs, manufactures and sells cables, connectivity products and networking solutions that serve as the foundation for modern data, audio and video systems as well as providing integrated solutions for specific needs such as those for smart buildings, industrial automation, and physical security applications. In addition to service on the Belden Board of Directors, Mr. Balk had served on various board committees including Finance, Compensation and Nominating and Corporate Governance.

Mr. Balk received a B.A. degree in Philosophy from Northwestern University in 1980 and a J.D. and M.B.A. degree from the University of Chicago in 1984.

Joe Beck is a Managing Director and Co-Head of Raymond James Healthcare Finance. Over his thirty year career on Wall Street, Mr. Beck has had a leadership role in many of the industry's most innovative and influential health care services transactions. Dr. Bettmann is *Emeritus* Professor of Radiology, Wake Forest University School of Medicine, and Co-Chair of the American College of Radiology Clinical Decision Support Committee. He received his undergraduate degree from Dartmouth College, his MD from Albert Einstein College of Medicine, and completed his post-graduate training at Harvard Medical School and its associated hospital. He has been active in academic medicine for many years, with over 150 peer-reviewed publications and more than 200 invited professorships and visiting lectureships around the country and in many other countries. Michael has done extensive research in many aspects of diagnostic radiology, and has served on and chaired many national committees for the American College of Radiology, the American Heart Association and the Society of Interventional Radiology.

DAVID KANIETAKERON FADDEN



David Fadden was born to John and Eva Fadden in Lake Placid, NY and grew up in the tiny Adirondack Mountain community of Onchiota. In his youth, he grew up surrounded by the wild beauty of the region, by his grandparents Ray and Christine Fadden's teachings and stories, and by his parents' creative example and encouragement. Eva Fadden expressed through wood sculpture and John, a retired art teacher, is a painter and prolific illustrator.

With strong ties to both Akwesasne and Onchiota, David has established a solid reputation as a painter, but he is also recognized as a storyteller, illustrator, writer, and sculptor. An admirer of the Dutch and Renaissance painters David finds inspiration in the old masters' eloquent and seemingly effortless use of light. His subjects range from traditional Haudenosaunee teachings to intimate and inspired portrayals of community members. Working primarily in acrylics, he often combines fine brushwork with palette knife applications to produce luminous interpretations of Haudenosaunee youth and elders.

David also developed a mosaic-like technique that captures the complexity and dynamic vitality of contemporary indigenous identity. This expressive technique remains a distinguishing feature in some of his most popular works. Another recent direction explores a sort of reverse appropriation, with iconic works by Rembrandt, Grant Wood, and others re-interpreted and given uniquely Haudenosaunee treatment such as *Girl with a Wampum Earring* and *Onkwehonwe Gothic*.

David has exhibited his work throughout the northeast and has received numerous commissions for illustration. Additionally, he is a sought-after storyteller, known for his gentle and captivating oration. He was recently invited to re-imagine a living wetland exhibit at the Wild Center (Tupper Lake, NY) from a Haudenosaunee perspective. The new interpretation features the Thanksgiving Address and

features painting and audio story elements. He is currently involved in redesigning the exhibit space at the Native North American Travelling College (Cornwall Island). Future ventures include a partnership with the John Brown Farm Historic Site (Lake Placid, NY) and a project with Akwesasne Tourism in which he will serve as lead art consultant and designer of an outdoor community-college sculpture project. David was showcased in his first solo show at the Strand Center Gallery in Plattsburgh, NY in 2020.

Much of his work can be seen at the Six Nations Iroquois Cultural Center in Onchiota, a family-run facility founded in 1954 by his grandparents. Today, David, his brother Donny, and their father John continue to maintain this very special museum welcoming visitors from around the world, breaking down stereotypes, and forwarding accurate understandings of Mohawk and Haudenosaunee culture.

ED FORBES



Ed Forbes, a journalist who has spent his career covering New York, New Jersey and the northeast, is currently Senior Director for News and Engagement for the USA TODAY Network, with oversight of opinion journalism and community engagement strategy across the northeast.

His career began at the Adirondack Daily Enterprise, where he covered the Adirondack Park Agency, and has included stops at the Lake Placid News, lohud.com and The Journal News in White Plains and NorthJersey.com and The Record in northern New Jersey. His work has been recognized by the Deadline Club, the Society of the Silurians, the Associated Press, the New Jersey Press Association, the New York Press Association and the New York News Publishers Association.

Forbes holds degrees from St. Lawrence University and the Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism. Forbes is currently treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the Frederic Remington Art Museum in Ogdensburg and serves as a director of Volunteer New York!, a non-profit that drives volunteerism in the Hudson Valley and is based in Tarrytown. In January, he began a term as a member of the North Country Public Radio Executive Council. In addition, he chairs the Town of Pound Ridge's Landmarks and Historic District Commission. Forbes is also a long-time member and former board member of the Westchester County Association. BEN IRELAND

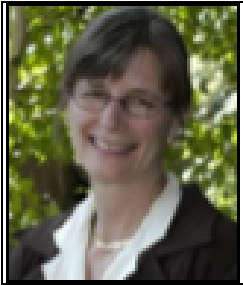

ELIZABETH M. LOWE



Elizabeth Lowe has had an overall career in environmental conservation, community development and visionary planning, including founding The Wild Center in Tupper Lake and working for the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation for close to 25 years, most recently as the Region 5 Director.

DEC Region 5 encompasses most of the Adirondacks and outlying counties. As Regional Director she oversaw the activities of approximately 200 full time and 500 seasonal employees and served as the DEC representative on the Adirondack Park Agency, Olympic Regional Development Authority and Lake Champlain Basin Program Steering Committee. She created and led a number of special policy initiatives and action plans for the benefit of the region which continued following her years of service.

Prior to becoming Regional Director, Ms. Lowe conceived of and served as Managing Director and Vice President of the Board of Directors for the Natural History Museum of the Adirondacks, “The Wild Center”, in Tupper Lake, an entity she launched in 1998, including the overall size, scope and concept. Ms. Lowe chose Tupper Lake for the location of the Museum and engaged local leadership and the community for initial support while reaching out region wide to a wide variety of groups, organizations and politicians for their support and input as well as routinely updating the regional press on the Museum’s development. She prepared and filed the legal documents to form the not-for-profit entity and initial Board of Trustees which she recruited consisting of active local community leaders, politicians and others from around the Park, and laid the groundwork for the site selection, master planning process, public engagement, fundraising, budgeting process, program planning, design development, and the recruitment of contractors and staff through to execution and completion of first year of operations in 2007. This process also included providing an immense number of public presentations upon request to groups and organizations throughout the state on an annual basis, including 30 presentations in 60 days during the height of the development effort. The design team selected for the Master Planning process, and ultimately through the construction phase, was one of 13 nationwide teams competing for the

project which she recruited through public outreach and by attending the Association of Science Technology Centers Conference in the Fall of 1998 in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada.

Prior to starting The Wild Center, Ms. Lowe served for nearly 20 years with DEC, building an extensive background in environmental management, public participation, consensus building, community development, public relations, and administrative policy working with a wide variety of public constituents and programs in both DEC Central and Regional offices over time.

Ms. Lowe obtained her undergraduate degree from Skidmore College where she received a B.A. with a double major in Biology and Music and received her Master's degree in Regional Planning from Cornell University. She has resided for most of her professional life in the Adirondacks, currently in Lake Placid and Long Lake, and has family ties to the region going back more than 100 years. She has served on a wide variety of community, regional and state not-for-profit boards and advisory boards, and routinely advises, upon request, a wide variety of other not-for-profits around the state with start-up support, special projects, mentoring, administration and/or development assistance.

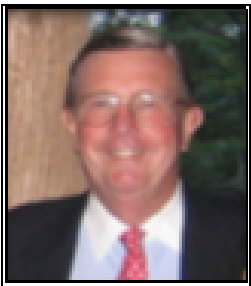
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LYNN BIRDSONG
